Message from the Chair of the Board of Directors and the President & CEO of HealthCareCAN





HealthCareCAN believes that now, more than ever, we need strong political leadership and sustainable funding that will renew and strengthen our nation's healthcare and health research system.

As the national voice of healthcare and health research institutions in Canada HealthCareCAN's purpose is to serve and advocate for our members. Throughout 2021 our message to politicians, decision-makers, stakeholders, and the public was clear and simple: Canada needs a stronger federal commitment and vision to enhance health research and sustain a high-quality healthcare system.

As the COVID pandemic has stubbornly persisted, causing tremendous challenges to the healthcare system, HealthCareCAN continues to press home the need for action. In October, during the federal election campaign, we were gratified to hear pledges to act to shore up healthcare and health research sphere from federal parties as a result of HealthCareCAN advocacy efforts. However, there is no doubt that the people of Canada deserve and need more from their leaders.

Canada can and must do better, which is why we are pressing for a rethinking of how the system should change so it is more integrated, efficient and covers the full healthcare spectrum. Other areas of great priority in our view include financial assistance for retention, recruitment, training, and the development of a qualified health workforce and, lastly, for more sustained funding for mental health Canada-wide, including our healthcare workers.

In recognition of the fact that the health human resources issues are causing tremendous challenges in the delivery of timely access to quality healthcare, 2021 saw the creation of the HealthCareCAN Health Human Resources Advisory Committee (HHRAC). This committee comprises healthcare People and Culture leaders from across Canada in a national network to provide critical advocacy and strategic direction and counsel on policy issues based on health sector needs. HHRAC also provides important advice for future leadership and development programs to be offered by HealthCareCAN's professional development division, CHA Learning.

HealthCareCAN is also tremendously focused and committed to raising the voice of health research institutions from across the country and ensuring that our policymakers understand how a healthy, vibrant health research ecosystem is a strong driver of economic growth for Canada. Again in 2021, HealthCareCAN greatly benefited from the input and leadership of our Vice Presidents of Research Committee in advancing the cause.

We are pleased to share the 2021 HealthCareCAN Annual Report to Members, which captures some of the work undertaken in support of our member institutions throughout the year. While this covers a lot of activity and effort, rest assured that we have no interest in resting on our laurels.






Now as we look to the future, we must continue to grow and change to support the needs of our members and learners and ensure that our programming is always current, relevant and innovative.

CHA Learning and Algonquin College to develop "Campus of Care"

Canada's health system is facing critical staff shortages in multiple specialties, threatening its sustainability and its capacity to continue providing innovative, high-quality care. This expanded agreement between HealthCareCAN and Algonquin College creates a crucial bridge between the health system and the post-secondary system to help ensure healthcare in Canada has the right people, working in the right places, at the right time.

The extended collaboration also opens the door for the co-design and development of new programs for the healthcare marketplace. This will build up a one-stop 'Campus of Care' educational 'hub' that healthcare professionals can access anytime, anywhere to upgrade skills and help reach their professional development goals over the entirety of their careers.

New systems improve efficiency and quality of services at CHA Learning

We are pleased to report that upon implementation of CHA Learning's new integrated student management and learning management systems, the department's efficiency and quality of service has drastically improved. A clear example of this has been in the time it takes for students to register and pay for their products (down from 5 business days to just 15 minutes). At the same time, student communication and faculty assignment have become 'automated' by the system, which we believe will translate into a better student experience and increased referrals.

2022 will be a year of capitalizing on these changes and our new learning systems and a year of polish and improvements as we start to enhance our programming to align with the capabilities of each of these new systems.

The 2021 National Health Leadership Conference

Adaptive leadership in complex times May 31st and June 1st, 2021



About the NHLC

The National Health Leadership Conference (NHLC), co-presented annually by the Canadian College of Health Leaders (CCHL) and HealthCareCAN, is the largest national gathering of health system decision—makers in Canada including trustees, chief executive officers, directors, managers and department heads.

The NHLC provides a forum for questions, debate and sharing strategies and solutions to the most pressing health system challenges.

The 2021 NHLC



The 2021 conference, whose theme was "Adaptive leadership in complex times", was held virtually on May 31 and June 1. We were pleased to have The Honourable Patty Hajdu, Federal Minister of Health (pictured above) devliver the opening address.

While virtual, the 2021 NHLC continued as in previous years to provide compelling keynote speakers, valuable educational sessions and thought-provoking panel discussions.

The program consisted of four plenary sessions and 28 concurrent sessions. The concurrent session program included one French session and eleven roundtable sessions.

We are pleased to report that a total of 457 individuals registered for the conference, 22 of whom were speakers. This meant that the 2021 NHLC was successful despite the change in format and the ongoing pandemic.

The Great Canadian Health Policy Dialogue

For 2021, the "Great Canadian Healthcare Debate" event, coordinated by HealthCareCAN, was held in a dialogue format as opposed to a debate format as done in previous years. The "Great Canadian Health Policy Dialogue" themed Leadership perspectives on the sustainability of Canada's healthcare system with moderator André Picard – Health Reporter and Columnist, The Globe and Mail was a success and had a great response on social media.






